- Electronics contain valuable, reusable materials like gold, steel, silver, copper and glass. They also contain harmful materials like lead, mercury, cadmium and chemical flame retardants. Recycling and reusing electronics protects the environment, conserves valuable raw materials and preserves landfill space.
- Appliances contain hazardous materials such as mercury containing switches and temperature control devices, oil, PCB capacitors and refrigerants.

RECYCLING...

The following items are **banned** from landfills and incinerators statewide and should be reused, recycled or composted.

CONTAINERS

- #1 and #2 plastics, bottles and jars
- Aluminum containers
- Bi-metal cans and containers
- Glass containers
- Steel (tin) cans and containers

PAPER & CARDBOARD

- Corrugated cardboard
- Magazines, catalogs and other materials on similar paper
- Newspaper and newsprint materials
- Office paper

YARD MATERIALS

- Grass clippings
- Debris and brush under 6" in diameter
- Leaves

AUTOMOTIVE ITEMS

- Lead-acid vehicle batteries
- Tires
- Used oil filters
- Waste oils

APPLIANCES

- Air conditioners
- Boilers
- Clothes dryers
- Clothes washers
- Dehumidifiers

- Freezers
- Furnaces
- Microwaves

COMPOSTING...

Compost is an environmentally friendly way to create healthy soil for Wisconsin's landscape. Compost made from yard materials and other organics, like food scraps, can replenish soil with microorganisms and nutrients. Wisconsin law prohibits landfill disposal of yard materials (also called "yard waste"), including leaves, grass clippings, brush and pieces of wood (branches, sticks, etc.) under 6 inches in diameter. Composting is an easy, inexpensive alternative to landfills that puts these resources to use instead of simply throwing them away.

FOOD WASTE

Food waste and scraps make up the largest part of trash in Wisconsin landfills. The Department of Natural Resources' 2020-21 Statewide Waste Characterization Study found that food waste made up 20% of trash going to Wisconsin landfills.

Preventing food waste is easy and powerful. You reduce greenhouse gas emissions and save natural resources. Plus, it can save you money. Composting food scraps and yard waste helps keep them out of the landfill and creates a soil-like material rich in stabilized carbon produced from the breakdown of organic materials.

DO COMPOST

- Grass clippings
- Leaves
- Straw
- Weeds & garden debris
- Small brush & twigs
- Vegetable and fruit peels, cores and

trimmings

- Sawdust & wood chips
- Eggshells
- Coffee grounds, tea leaves & paper filters

DO NOT COMPOST

- Meat, bones, fat
- Dairy products
- Oils
- Weeds gone to seed
- Whole branches, logs
- Pet or human waste
- Charcoal briquette ash

- Sawdust or ash from treated wood

Tablets, capsules, over-the-counter medications, vitamins, sample medications, creams, ointments, lotions, patches, liquids in leak proof plastic containers, inhalers and prescription drugs used for ears, eyes, nose and throat.

UNACCEPTED MEDICATIONS

Needles (insulin or syringes), thermometers, blood or infectious waste, blood glucose monitors, lancets and medications from local businesses.

BATTERY RECYCLING REQUIREMENTS FOR HOUSEHOLDS

Wisconsin has no legal requirements, with the exception of lead-acid batteries, for disposal of household-generated batteries. These include alkaline, lithium, lithium ion, metal hydride, nickel-cadmium, silver oxide and zinc-air. Batteries come in many sizes and can be rechargeable or single use. The Department of Natural Resources recommends recycling many battery types by taking them to a drop-off site. Batteries should never go in household recycling bins. For more information, go to dnr.wi.gov and search "batteries."

Lead-acid batteries, or "automotive type batteries," are banned from disposal. Consumers may recycle lead-acid batteries to any Wisconsin retailer that sells these batteries. This service is free to customers who buy a new battery. Customers may be charged a fee if they bring in a used battery without buying a new one.

KNOW THE RISK: HOW TO PREPARE AND STORE BATTERIES FOR RECYCLING

Many batteries, especially lithium ion, pose a fire risk due to their chemistries and ability to hold a charge. Batteries can spark and start a fire if their terminals touch metal or each other. The following recommendations can lower the risk of fire.

- Put each battery in an individual, clear plastic bag, or tape each battery's terminals **with clear packaging tape**.
- Store batteries in a non-metal container.
- Store swollen or damaged batteries in sand or kitty litter.
- Keep battery labels visible.
- Take stored batteries to a drop-off location frequently.
- Single-use alkaline batteries have little recycling value and may be safely thrown in the trash.

Batteries used in many households and office products, as well as motor vehicle batteries, contain a variety of heavy metals and other materials that can be harmful to human health and the environment if not handled properly.
